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## Introduction

Thank you so much for picking up this book! Since you're reading this I'm fairly certain you are interested in learning to make disciples of Jesus. Are you curious how to get started? Are you connected to someone, but stuck on how to help them take their next spiritual step? Are you just looking for ideas on how to help someone follow Jesus more closely? Maybe you feel like you're not growing in your own faith, and need something to provide a kickstart.

That's the intent of this book. I hope that by reading this and following these suggestions you will grow into a more faithful follower of Jesus, and be able to help others do the same.

This book will try to follow Jesus' example on making disciples. There will be questions to discuss, actions to take, and more importantly prayers to pray. However, this book isn't a magic bullet for discipleship. It doesn't replace prayer and Scripture as the tools of discipleship. This book isn't effective without the power of the Holy Spirit at work in you and around you.

This book is only a guide to help you connect with others so that you both may take a next spiritual step in your faith.

### **How should you use this book?**

This book would be helpful for you to read on your own and assess how you're growing spiritually. Have you engaged in sharing the Gospel, developing spiritual habits, building relationships, and serving others?

Ideally, you'll walk through these pages with someone else.

Its meant to help you disciple others, and repeat the process.



## Part 1

### **Understanding Discipleship**

Are you engaged in discipleship?

So far, you have reviewed discipleship and the need to help others grow spiritually. You may have learned some things about yourself as well. The next part of this book is meant to give you tools to start engaging others in discipleship.

This book cannot answer every question or prepare you for every situation, but it will give you simple steps to take with anyone.

Remember that discipleship is powered by the Holy Spirit and centered on the Word of God. Without either, growth won't happen.



# What is Discipleship?

Read Matthew 4:18-22

Who did you meet in these verses?

What were they doing before Jesus came?

What did Jesus tell them in verse 19?

How did these men respond to Jesus?

Jesus called these men to follow Him. Peter, Andrew, James, and John were the first of Jesus' disciples. A disciple is someone who follows and studies under someone else, but it's more than mere knowledge or behavior modification. To follow Jesus is to be completely changed.

When Jesus said, "Follow Me" He called these men to lay their lives down and serve Jesus. Following Jesus is to put the plans and commands of Jesus before your own. A disciple of Jesus gives up ownership of their life and surrenders it to Jesus. He becomes Lord, and you follow His lead.

Jesus also promised to change these men. If they followed Jesus they would not be the same. He said, "I will make you." Jesus will begin a work in your life to change your desires, your thinking, even your purpose. Jesus will shape you into the person He designed you to be.

These new disciples were given a new purpose—“fishers of men.” Following Jesus meant prioritizing His kingdom goals over your own goals. Eventually, after some training, Jesus would send these very disciples into the world to preach the Gospel and help others know Jesus.

So, as Jim Putman said in the Real-Life Discipleship Manual, a disciple of Jesus is someone who follows Jesus, is changed by Jesus, and is committed to the mission of Jesus.

By this definition, are you a disciple of Jesus?

## **How did Jesus make disciples?**

Open your Bible to Matthew 9:35-38.

What did Jesus do throughout all the cities and villages?

What did Jesus see about the crowds in verse 36?

How did Jesus instruct his disciples to pray for these people?

Now read Matthew 10:1-5.

How many men did Jesus call to be his disciples?

What abilities did He give these men?

In verse 5, what did Jesus do with these men?

As you read the Gospel books, you'll see in great depth how Jesus made disciples. He demonstrates all we need to know to help others follow Jesus. Let's summarize it this way:

**Jesus modeled ministry.** He showed his followers how to love and serve people. You and I must be engaged in ministry, loving our neighbors as Jesus did.

**Jesus called the disciples into ministry.** He let them know clearly that they were to pray for the people and to follow His example. They could not sit on the sidelines. They needed to decide to follow Jesus.

**Jesus equipped the disciples for ministry.** He gave them the ability to do the very things He did: to cast out unclean spirits and to heal diseases. Jesus taught them how to serve.

**Jesus sent the disciples out.** They did not stay huddled around the campfire listening to Jesus, but they went into the communities to preach, teach and serve.

Making disciples requires relationships with other disciples. We aren't expected to do it alone. Discipleship happens as we learn together, love together, and serve together.

## Why is discipleship important for me today?

In Matthew 28:19-20 Jesus says,  
Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age.”  
Yes, you are supposed to make disciples. Jesus commands us to make disciples. Every follower of Christ is mandated to share Jesus with others so that they may know and follow Jesus also.

Discipleship is important for you because  
its how you grow spiritually.  
It's also how you help others grow spiritually.

### **Discipleship is a growth process.**

Read Ephesians 4:11-14.

How are believers to grow spiritually according to these verses?

It is clear that disciples of Jesus are to grow spiritually. And we are to help one another in the process. Spiritual growth is becoming more like Jesus in every way. As a plant grows incrementally so our hearts, our minds, our bodies ought to grow more like Christ over time.

## How do we assess our spiritual growth?

I have found two resources that help me examine my own life and see areas of growth and certain needs. Real-Life Ministries led by Pastor Jim Putman developed a training manual, Real-Life Discipleship Training Manual, that outlines 5 stages of discipleship: Spiritually Dead, Infant, Child, Young Adult, and Parent. Michael Kelley with Lifeway in his book Creating a Discipleship Pathway, identified certain signs of growth in believers. I'll briefly review these resources here, but I highly recommend you picking these resources up for yourself.

### Disciple to Disciple Questions

Discuss what you've read and these questions with someone else.

Are you a disciple of Jesus? Have you decided to follow Him, to be changed by Him, and to be committed to His mission?

Who played an influential role in your personal discipleship?

Who do you know that would benefit from your discipleship?

Begin praying for God to lead you to someone with whom you can begin a discipling relationship.

## **Are you growing spiritually?**

Use these next two tools to assess your own personal growth.

### 5 Stages of Discipleship

by Real-Life Ministries

These are stages of growth. A person grows from one stage to the next as they abide in Christ and follow His lead.

#### **Spiritually Dead**

These are not believers. They are dead in sin and unrepentant. What they need most is to hear the Gospel of Jesus. John 5:24 says, Truly, truly, I say to you, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life. He does not come into judgment but has passed from death to life. Until they receive Jesus as Lord they remain dead.

#### **Spiritual Infant**

Everything is new! Infants, similar to newborn babes, are ignorant and dependent. They need someone who will teach them and care for them. They need to learn new truths, and new habits, and join a new community. Many won't know the Bible, how to pray, or the importance of joining the church.

#### **Spiritual Child**

Their physical age doesn't matter. You can be 80 years old and still be a spiritual child. A spiritual child is self-centered. They try to "do church" on their own, and don't get involved in service. They need to connect to God personally, build relationships with others, and learn their God-given purpose.

## **Spiritual Young Adult**

A shift has taken place. A spiritual child has grown into a young adult when they realize, "It's not all about me." A young adult is others-focused and desires to serve others. They must be equipped for ministry, given opportunities to serve, and encouraged in ministry.

## **Spiritual Parent**

In the same way, parents are responsible for their children; a spiritual parent is responsible for others. A spiritual parent reproduces or makes disciples. They will share Jesus with the spiritually dead. A parent will nurture and teach the infant. They will help a spiritual child connect to God and the community. A parent will equip the young adult for ministry and raise more spiritual parents (aka disciple-makers).

## **Personal Check**

In which stage are you? How do you know?

Are you learning new Biblical truths and new Biblical habits?

Have you connected with God and His church?

Are you engaged in kingdom ministry?

Are you sharing Jesus with the spiritually dead? Who?

Are you helping others grow spiritually? Who?

## **Signs Along the Way**

“these are the characteristics that ought to be present, in increasing measure, in the life of someone who is growing toward Christlikeness.”

### **Engaging the Bible**

Transformation can be recognized when our mind is sharpened by the Bible, our perspective is shaped by the Bible, and our actions are directed by the Bible. (2 Tim. 3:16-17)

### **Obey God and Deny Self**

Discipleship is the process of obedience to one who is in authority over you. Transformation can be seen when we progressively set aside earthly delights for kingdom priorities. (Luke 9:23)

### **Serve God and others**

Transformation is evident when personal needs and even dreams are set aside for the needs we see in others. (Matthew 25:40)

### **Share Christ**

Even with the need to live out the effects of the gospel, maturing believers know that speaking about the message is a necessity. Transformation is evident when we talk about Christ and the message of the gospel. (1 Peter 3:15)

### **Exercise Faith**

Transformation is seen in believers when risk aversion is set aside and our lives are characterized by faithful obedience to God's will. (Gal. 2:20)

## **Seek God**

Transformation is seen when our desire to know God more deeply and experience His work more fully. (Matthew 6:33)

## **Build Relationships**

Our faith is personal but it is not intended to be private. Our horizontal relationships should develop just as our vertical relationship with God does. Transformation is occurring when relational maturity is evident in our lives. (Acts 2:42)

## **Live Unashamed**

Transformation is evident when a believer is transparent and unashamed in presenting their own life as being aligned with Christ. (Romans 1:16)

## **Make Disciples**

Every disciple is called to make disciples. Transformation is evident as a believer steps out on mission to reach others. (Matthew 28:19-20)

## **Love God**

Every believer is to love God with all their being.

Transformation is evident, that is, a person's love for God grows as they continue in obedience to His commands. (John 14:15)

## **Personal Check**

As you review these signs of growth, ask yourself:

Can I see this sign in my life?

Am I growing or lacking in this area? How do I know?

Can I see this in others?

## **Disciple to Disciple Questions**

Discuss what you've read and these questions with someone else.

What is discipleship? How do you understand it today?

Where have you seen the most growth in your own spiritual journey?

What do you think is your next step to grow spiritually?

Do you have anyone discipling you in this season of your life? Who?

If not, who might you ask to help you grow spiritually? Share this booklet with them.

Who do you know now that might be interested in your help growing spiritually? Would you ask them?

Pray today for wisdom in discipleship. Ask the Lord to give you opportunity to grow personally and to help someone else.



## Part 2

# Taking your Next Steps in Discipleship

Ready to step forward in discipleship?

So far you have reviewed discipleship and the need to help others grow spiritually. You may have learned some things about yourself as well. The next part of this book is meant to give you tools to start engaging others in discipleship. This book cannot answer every question or prepare you for every situation, but it will give you simple steps to take with anyone. Just remember that discipleship is powered by the Holy Spirit and centered on the Word of God. Without either, growth won't happen.



## Share the Gospel of Jesus with others

*But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth. Acts 1:8*

Everyone needs to hear the Gospel of Jesus. It is the power of salvation for everyone (Romans 1:16). How can anyone believe if they have not heard the gospel (Romans 10:14)?

According to Jesus in Acts, we are to be His witnesses all over the world.

Disciples of Jesus have believed in the Gospel and are ready to share it. How about you? Are you ready?

### What is the Gospel?

1 Corinthians 15:3-5 summarizes the gospel nicely:

*For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve.*

The Gospel is simply the message that Jesus died for our sins, was buried and rose again to give us eternal life. By his death Jesus made a way for sinners to be forgiven and be reconciled to God in a personal relationship. But a person must repent of their sins and believe in Jesus as Lord to be saved. It's a simple message.

As a disciple of Jesus, you need to know the Gospel and be ready to share it with others.

There are several presentations of the gospel, but I have found the 3 Circles by the North American Mission Board most effective.

Have you trusted in Jesus as your Lord and Savior?  
Are you ready to share it with others?

### **Sharing your Story**

In addition to sharing the simple Gospel message (like the 3 Circles), you can share your own story of faith. How did you become a disciple of Jesus? I know there's a powerful story, and your story can help others see their need for Jesus.

Take some time and write your story of faith. It doesn't need to be long. Your story is really not about you as much as it is about what God has done in you. Your story shares how God saved you.

## Here are 3 questions that can help you write your story:

What was your life like before you accepted Jesus as your Lord and Savior?

How did you accept Christ?

How did your life change after accepting Jesus?

## **Disciple to Disciple Questions**

*Discuss what you've read and these questions with someone else.*

Do you know the simple Gospel message? You might practice sharing the Gospel (even the 3 Circles) with one another.

What key Bible verses are good to share when presenting the Gospel? (Hint: Romans 3:23) You might try memorizing some of these together.

Can you share your story of faith in less than 5 minutes with one another?

What amazes you about the Gospel of Jesus?

What encourages you about the Gospel of Jesus?

Do you know an unbeliever personally? Begin to pray for them asking the Lord to save them, and to give you opportunities to share the Gospel with them. Together you can pray for one another and those far from God by name.

Each time you meet together, you should always pray for the lost by name.

## Keep Spiritual Habits

And rising very early in the morning, while it was still dark, he departed and went out to a desolate place, and there he prayed. Mark 1:35

A disciple of Jesus demands discipline. In fact disciple is a root word for discipline. Discipline isn't about the time you got in trouble for not cleaning your room as a kid. It's really about training yourself to think and do things a certain way. A disciple of Jesus disciplines themselves to follow Christ—thinking and doing things like Jesus.

It's important to develop certain spiritual habits, or disciplines, in your daily routine. Jesus would often rise early, find a space away from everyone else, and pray to God. He knew the Scriptures so well that when the devil tempted Him in the wilderness, he resisted quoting verses. Jesus spent time with the disciples teaching and doing local ministry.

There are many spiritual habits, but here let's talk about prayer, reading the Bible, and participating in Biblical community.

### Habit #1—Prayer

How's your prayer life? If you're like me, it struggles quite often. There are days I don't give much time to prayer, and others when I'm praying a lot just to get out of a mess. My prayers often are focused on my wants and needs, or for the physical needs of others. Those things are important, but that's not all prayer needs to be.

In Luke 11:1, Jesus' disciples asked him, "*Lord, teach us to pray.*" They had seen Jesus pray so often they recognized they needed help. So Jesus gave them a model to follow. We often call it the Lord's prayer. You can find it in Luke 11, but Matthew's record in Matthew 6:9-13 is more well-known. Here's an acronym to summarize the way Jesus taught His disciples to pray:

## **Praise**

Begin your prayers praising God. Ponder the wonder of God's attributes—His power, His love, His goodness, His justice, His grace and more. You might even sing to him. Praise is simply telling God what you think of Him. The Psalms are a great place to learn how to praise God.

## **Repent**

Take time to consider and confess any sins you've committed recently. Ask the Lord to forgive you and trust in His forgiveness.

## **Ask**

We tend to spend most of our time here. One pastor once asked, "If God answered your prayers would it just change you, or would it change the world?" God certainly cares about what matters to you, but He's also interested in helping others. Ask for what you need, but also ask God to meet the needs of others—physically and spiritually. Pray for the lost to be saved.

## **Yield**

Trust that God's will is best. We can ask for a lot of things, but trust that the Father will give you what you need. You won't always like His answer, or understand His timing. But you can trust that God's will is best. Follow His lead.

## Habit #2—Reading the Bible

Paul told Timothy that all Scripture is profitable and sufficient to equip every believer to follow Jesus. (2 Timothy 3:16-17)

Jesus even commanded His disciples to teach others to observe all that He commanded us (Matthew 28:19-20). We must learn His word and obey it. Here's a simple guide to help you study any passage.

**Read** the passage carefully to understand the plain idea. As you read, note key words, key phrases, and characters. Don't read too much at one time as it becomes difficult to focus on the details. You might read a section or chapter a day.

**Explain** the passage. After reading the passage answer some of these questions.

Who do you meet in the passage? What are they like?

What happens in the passage? (What? When? Where? Who? How?)

What do you learn about God in the passage?

What do you learn about people in the passage?

**Apply** the passage to your life for obedience.

What does the passage demand of you?

How does the passage change the way you relate to others?

How does the passage prompt you to pray?

**Do** what it says. Consider something specific you can do in response to the passage this week. Who can you share it with?


## Habit #3—Join with Other Believers

Simply get involved with the church. The church doesn't refer to a brick and mortar building, but rather a group of people called out to follow Jesus. The disciples spent time with Jesus and one another as they learned to follow Jesus. They served together, prayed together, learned together, and stuck together. No one was meant to live the Christian life alone.

*Hebrews 10:24-25 says, And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near.*

In other words, we are expected to gather together and encourage one another to live like Jesus! Gather for worship on Sundays. Meet with a small group Bible study building relationships with others who can encourage you and hold you accountable. Get involved in a ministry team where you can serve side by side with other believers in kingdom work.

A good friend of mine once shared, "A Christian who doesn't get involved with the church is like a single coal separated from the other coals. When you light a charcoal grill you pile all the coals together to increase the heat. If you pull one coal away, it will cool and eventually die out." Don't neglect gathering with other believers.



## Disciple to Disciple Questions

Discuss what you've read and these questions with someone else.

Can you think of other spiritual habits in addition to prayer, reading the Bible and joining with other believers?

Do you have a time and place set aside each day to pray and read the Bible? When and where?


What helps you pray? What makes prayer hard for you?



## **Maintain healthy, godly relationships**

Undoubtedly, as you meet with another disciple intentionally helping one another grow spiritually, relationships will get messy. There will be conflict, differences of opinion, hurt, and misunderstandings. Relationships are hard, and require hard work to build and maintain them healthily. Discipleship cannot happen apart from a relationship. We need to be connected to God and one another to grow. So, how do we make these relationships work?

It's important to handle conflict in a Biblical way. Conflict is like a fresh wound. If you ignore it too long it will get worse. If you address it right away, though there may be pain, it will heal.

What does the Bible say about conflict?

Colossians 3:12-15 says

*Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful.*

As followers of Jesus, we are to be compassionate, kind, humble, and patient with others. We are to come alongside others and help them through difficult times. If someone wrongs us, we are to forgive as Jesus has forgiven us—unconditionally.

As you meet together, go out of your way to love one another, encourage each, speaking truth to one another, and remaining committed to one another.

There isn't a simple formula for handling conflict with others. How would you handle conflict with one another if it arises? List a few guidelines to follow to help you navigate conflict if it comes.



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Read Matthew 18:15-20, Romans 12:9-21 and Ephesians 4:31-32 for more on relationships.

### Making Relationships Work with Others

As you meet together, you will talk often about relationships you have with others. You may even seek advice on how to work on these relationships in a Biblical way. Here are a few suggested guidelines to help:

Keep things confidential. Don't share with others what someone has confided in you (not even a spouse).

Don't speak ill or gossip about others.

Listen to one another honestly.

Look for what the Bible says about the issue.

Pray for one another and the relationship.

## Disciple to Disciple Questions

Discuss what you've read and these questions with someone else.

First, how is your relationship with God? Are you submitted to God in everything, or are you trying to have your way in something?

Are you putting others first or yourself?

How would Jesus treat the other person?

What does the Bible say about your relationship issue?

How can we pray for this person?

Pray together over these relationships.

## Serving Others in Ministry

When Jesus spent time with His disciples He was preparing them for the time when He would depart from this world, leaving them here. What did Jesus expect the disciples to do when He left? Ministry.

The Father sent Jesus into the world to seek and to save the lost. Jesus called the disciples to follow Him and now He is sending them into the world as witnesses.

John 17:18 says,

*As you sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world.*

Jesus sent His disciples and He has sent you. As a disciple of Jesus we are sent into the world to serve others and share the love of Jesus with others. The disciples are trained to carry on the ministry of Christ in the world today.

So, what is your ministry? How are you serving others so that you may share Jesus with others? For some that's an easy question, but for others its more difficult.

I remember when I was sixteen, my church asked me to teach a VBS class. My heart was filled with joy and excitement, and gave it my all. Every volunteer came to church that Sunday evening to prepare their rooms, and when I walked into my room I was met by an older man. He said, "I'm your assistant for the week." As a teenager, I didn't expect this, and I asked him, "What should we do first?" He said, "This is your class. You tell me." In that moment, I realized they trusted me to lead these kids. I loved every moment of it, and by the end of the week the Holy Spirit had made it clear in my heart—I was called to ministry.

Now I'm a pastor leading a church, and loving every minute of it. Its easy for me to know how God wants me to serve others in ministry. I'm called and equipped to preach, teach, and shepherd the church.

But it wasn't always easy. After graduating high school, I went to public college and earned a History degree with a teaching certificate. I still desired to serve in ministry, but the Lord led me into the mission field—the public high school. This was difficult for me because I felt that I wasn't obeying God. I was working at a high school, not working at a church. Through many hard days, lots of prayer, and wise advice from some beloved mentors, God helped me see that He wanted me in that school. He trained me to serve teenagers, love parents, and build relationships with teachers. We often plan our way, but God establishes our steps.

So, what about you? Right now you might be thinking, "But you're a pastor. You're supposed to serve in ministry. I've got a job, Monday through Friday. Does God really expect me to serve in ministry?" The answer is Yes!

Paul wrote to the Corinthians in 1 Corinthians 12:7 saying, To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. He told the Romans, *"Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them"* (Romans 12:6). In other words, you've been gifted by God to serve others. He has sent you to serve others.

## **Prayer Care Share**

Getting Started in Ministry

### **Prayer**

Begin by praying for those around you who are hurting, wandering, far from God, etc. Ask for opportunities to connect with someone and start building a relationship. Be watchful in prayer with thanksgiving.

### **Care**

As you go in life, watch for opportunities to serve them. Start a conversation with a neighbor. Get coffee with a friend. Volunteer at soup kitchen or shelter. Visit an elderly person at home. Find ways to care for others.

### **Share**

Continue to love and serve them. Don't do it once and settle for that sense of accomplishment. No, instead continue caring for them. Build a relationship of trust so that you may share Jesus with them.

## Disciple to Disciple Questions

Discuss what you've read and these questions with someone else.

What do you love to do? What are you passionate about?  
How might God use these skills and abilities to serve others?

Whom do you love to serve? Are you a kids' person? Do you love teenagers? Do you enjoy spending time with senior adults?

What are the greatest needs you observe in the world around you? Are you drawn to meet one of those needs?


Have you had any life experiences that have equipped you to serve others with similar experiences?

What ministries is your church already doing that you can join?

Do you know someone already serving somewhere with whom you can partner?

Read the following passages: Romans 12:3-8, 1 Corinthians 12, and 1 Peter 4:10-11. What spiritual gifts can you identify? Which one fits you best?

What will you do next?



## Part 3

### Do it again with someone else

#### Start making disciples of others

I hope that this booklet has been helpful to you in discipleship. That's what we're commanded to do: make disciples. We are to help others follow Jesus more closely. Thank you for obeying our Lord Jesus and loving others.


